## Winning Project Reconnecting Communities Grant Program

The Reconnecting Communities Grant Program was created under the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law to reconnect communities that are cut off from opportunity and burdened by past transportation infrastructure decisions.

The first round of \$185 million in funding was awarded to 45 communities (49 Planning Grants and 6 Capital Construction Grants) for fiscal year 2022. Now known as the Reconnecting Communities and Neighborhoods Grant Program, cities can use the case study below to submit a competitive application for the \$3.2 billion funding opportunity due on 8/28/23.

## Charlotte, North Carolina: Reconnecting the West End

Planning Grant Awarded at \$1,000,000 • See Charlotte's winning application

This project will study two key interchanges in Charlotte, NC's West End, which is home to Johnson C. Smith University, a Historically Black University. The goal of the project is to reconnect this historically African American community to jobs, healthcare, grocery stores, and public space for non-motorized travelers. It will also propose recommendations for equitable transit-oriented development and the inclusion of mixed-use and mixed-income housing development for the West End community.

Making the Case: In the 1960's, this community was victimized by redlining and urban renewal. The construction of Highway I-277 in the West End demolished a thriving Black neighborhood and cut the community off from economic activity. As a result, The West End is now classified by the federal government as an economically disadvantaged community, and the university is surrounded by highways.



## **Key Project Initiatives:** The Charlotte Neighborhood Equity and Stabilization (NEST) Commission will review and recommend "anti-Mitigating displacement strategies and tools for protecting residents displacement of moderate to high vulnerability of displacement," to help mitigate the high risk of displacement for residents in West End. The project will utilize tools such as the **Environmental** Quantifying Justice Screening and Mapping Tool and the FHWA Screening Tool for Equity Analysis of Projects to equity continue promoting equity and inclusion. The grant emphasizes equitable transit-oriented Reclaiming the development and the reclamation of land for public neighborhood space, housing, and jobs that were previously destroyed and displaced. The project will create more options for pedestrians, Support for cyclists, and public transit users, as those without residents access to a vehicle tend to have lower incomes. Seeks to provide business opportunities for Black, **Inclusive** Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) and womencontracting owned firms through the **Charlotte Business** framework **INClusion program.** Developed a **community participation plan**, partnered Community with community organizations and agencies, and de-**Engagement** veloped strategies for engagement to ensure the local and Inclusion community will be involved in the project planning.
